My Dear Friends,

As you read this, we find ourselves on the threshold of another Advent Season, that four week time of watching and waiting that leads us to Christmas. We travel an ancient road that leads us all the way to Bethlehem, where Christians believe that God was born into the world. We call this birth the

Incarnation. “The Word became flesh, and dwelt among us,” said John in his Gospel. The story of Christmas is one of the oldest and best known stories in Western Civilization, but honestly, it is a story told and retold all around the world. What could be more hopeful and holy than the story of God visiting us, of God choosing to be Emmanuel, “God-with-us?” Most of all, Christmas tells a story of hope, and one filled with grace and truth.

This year, First Presbyterian Church enters this Advent Season with the intention of singing our way to Bethlehem! The Gospel of Luke contains a number of songs of this blessed season, and there is nothing that brings back more memories or evokes more hope than the music of the Advent and Christmas season. We will begin Advent by singing, “O Come, O Come Emmanuel.” Each Sunday we will sing responses throughout worship of music that tells best this greatest of all stories. We will light the candles of Advent, candles that announce hope, peace, joy and love. But we will pay special attention to the songs that the Gospel of Luke sings for us. They include the song the Angel of the Lord sang to Zechariah when Zechariah was silenced until the birth of his son John into the world. We will listen carefully to the song that Gabriel sang to Mary, when she received word that she would give birth to a child that was the work of the Holy Spirit. We have come to call this song The Annunciation. Some of the most exquisite art in the world remembers this moment. We will attend carefully to Mary’s song of this coming birth, one of the most prophetic and powerful Biblical songs ever sung. We

call it The Magificat, from the Latin of Mary’s first line, “My soul magnifies the Lord.” We will also attend to the Song of Zechariah, for when Zechariah finally was allowed to speak, he could not contain the Good News that he had to proclaim: “By the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high will break upon us.” And of course, we will listen for the word the shepherds heard on that night of nights, sung by a choir of angels: “Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those who God favors!”

The great German Renaissance man Goethe said once that “The highest can never be spoken; it can only be sung.” That is why the most powerful parts of this wonderful story are the parts of it that we sing. I invite you to join us in the magic and wonder of this season. The deepest truth of life is that we all find ourselves on a journey. This journey started with our birth and will not be over until we die. It is easy to get lost on the way, or to lose a sense of our destiny in the midst of how difficult and trying life can get. Without music and faith to sustain us, I do not know how we ever find our way. Without this truest and best of all stories it is easy to lose our orientation.

While all four Gospels unite to tell this story, most scholars and believers agree that no one tells it any better than Luke. Maybe this is because Luke sings so much of this ageless story of grace and truth! Please watch for the coming Sundays of this Advent and Christmas season, and plan to join us in the journey that leads all the way to Bethlehem. I have always felt like when I get all the way to Bethlehem, I have somehow made it home.

Volunteer Opportunities at Safe Haven Family Shelter

Did you know that homeless families often must be separated by gender if they need overnight lodging in Nashville? Did you know there is only ONE shelter in Nashville where homeless families can stay



together? That place, Safe Haven Family Shelter, is located just 10 minutes from First Presbyterian Church and offers a wonderful volunteer opportunity to share with your family, a group of families or a group of friends. Our church has pledged to provide volunteers to the Shelter six times a year in the following ways:

Overnight Volunteers — One to two people to spend the night. They arrive at 5:45 P.M. to receive orientation and a briefing. They eat dinner with the residents. They have their own room (with two twin beds) and bathroom. They lock the shelter door at 10:00 P.M. They may leave at 6:00 A.M. the next morning.

Meal Volunteers — Two or more individuals are asked to prepare an entree, two vegetable dishes and a dessert for between 10-25 residents. They should arrive no later than 5:30 P.M. and dinner is served at 6:00 P.M. They too get the opportunity to eat with the residents. After cleaning up, they are free to go home.

We are currently seeking volunteers to serve in 2012 as follows: Overnight Volunteers on February 6, April 2, August 6, October 1 and December 3; Meal Volunteers for dinner on June 4, August 6 and October 1. Music Discussion Class

This discussion-based class is intended for anyone interested in learning more about the major works that FPC's choirs perform. You do not need to be musically-inclined or literate in order to attend. The classes will be very informal, and you do not have to attend every class since each class will focus on a specific topic or section of music. Although there will be some information given — background for the piece, composer biographies, text translations where applicable, some basic music theory — the classes are intended to be discussion-based.

The FPC choirs have two major performances this year: a holiday concert on Sunday, December 11, at 4:00 P.M., which will feature Ralph Vaughan Williams' *Hodie*, and a concert on Sunday, January 22, at 2:00 P.M. featuring Mozart's *Requiem*. There will be two separate classes for each concert, each occurring for four weeks during the Sunday School hour. **Hodie:** November 27, December 4 and 11. **Requiem:** January 1, 8, 15 and 22. Classes will be held upstairs at the Cheek House.

Pre-Concert Lecture

All concert attendees are welcome to attend a brief 15-20 minute pre-concert lecture beginning 30 minutes prior to both the *Hodie* and *Requiem* concerts. The “Emmanuel, God With Us” lecture will begin at 3:30 P.M. on Sunday, December 11, and will focus on Ralph Vaughan Williams' *Hodie*. The Mozart's *Requiem* lecture will begin at 1:30 P.M. on Sunday, January 22. Each lecture will provide concert-goers with relevant background information on the composer and the primary work being performed. The lectures will be held in the Chapel.

Teacher Biography

An active church musician, Justin Near is an alto in the Sanctuary Choir and in the past has performed with the Ringtones handbell choir and as a French horn soloist at FPC. Justin holds two degrees from Marshall University — a B.F.A. in Music Theory and French Horn Performance, as well as a B.A. in Latin. Several years ago, while a receptionist and an archivist for the Nashville Symphony, Justin began pursuing a Masters degree in Theological Studies at Lipscomb University which was temporarily put aside to raise her family. In the near future, she hopes to continue her education, focusing on major symphonic religious works and their profound, long-lasting effects on humanity.
