My Dear Friends,

Over the last five years, I have made a habit of offering a Top Ten List of Biblical passages for our edification at the start of the New Year. As 2011 marks the five hundredth anniversary of the publishing of the King James Bible in 1611, it is only fitting that we list our passages from this venerable and influential work. The King James Bible is arguably the most influential book ever published in the development of the English language, and in ways we scarcely are aware, it speaks to us still today. The Bible provides for us an inexhaustible source of wisdom and tells the Gospel story in a way that gives hope to all. Our Presbyterian Church in the Confession of 1967 says this about the Bible: "The one sufficient revelation of God is Jesus Christ, the Word of God incarnate, to whom the Holy Spirit bears unique and authoritative witness through the Holy Scriptures, which are received and obeyed as the word of God written. The Scriptures are not a witness among others, but the witness without parallel." So as we enter 2012, let this witness speak to you:

1. "But God proves His love for us in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5:8)

2. "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills. From whence cometh my help? My help cometh from the Lord, who made heaven and earth. He will not suffer thy foot to be moved; He who keepeth thee will not slumber. Behold, He that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep. The Lord is thy keeper; the Lord is thy shade upon thy right hand. The sun shall not smite thee by day, nor the moon by night. The Lord shall preserve thee from all evil; He shall preserve thy soul. The Lord shall preserve thy going out and thy coming in from this time forth, and even for evermore." (Psalm 121)

3. "My brethren, count it all joy when ye fall into various trials, knowing this, that the testing of your faith worketh patience. But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, lacking nothing." (James 1:2-4)

4. "Beloved, let us love one another; for love is of God, and everyone that loveth is born of God and knoweth God...Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us, and sent His Son to the propitiation for our sins." (I John 4:7,10)

5. "Ho, everyone that thirsteth, come to the waters, and he that hath no money; come, buy and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk

without money and without price. Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread? And your labor for that which satisfieth not? Hearken diligently to me, and eat that which is good, and let your soul delight itself in fatness. Incline your ear, and come unto me; and your soul shall live, and I will make an everlasting covenant with you, even the sure mercies of David." (Isaiah 55:1-3)

6. "Behold, I stand at the door and knock; if any man hear my voice, and openeth the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me." (Revelation 3:20)

7. "Therefore, I say unto you, Be not anxious for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; not yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than food and the body more than raiment...Be therefore, not anxious about tomorrow; for tomorrow will be anxious for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is its own evil." (Matthew 6:25, 34)

8. "God at sundry times and in diverse manners spoke in time past unto the fathers by the prophets, Hath in these last days spoken to us by His Son, whom He hath appointed heir of all things, by whom also He made the worlds." (Hebrews 1:1,2)

9. "Out of the depths have I cried unto Thee, O Lord. Lord, hear my voice; let Thine ears be attentive to the voice of my supplications. If Thou, Lord, shouldst mark iniquities, O Lord, who could stand? But there is forgiveness with Thee, that Thou mayest be feared. I wait for the Lord, my soul doth wait, and in His word do I hope. My soul waiteth for the Lord more than watchmen for the morning; I say, more than watchmen for the morning. O Israel, hope in the Lord; for with the Lord there is steadfast love, and with Him is plenteous redemption. And He shall redeem Israel all His iniquities." (Psalm 130)

10. "Now the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that ye may abound in hope, through the power of the Holy Spirit." (Roman 15:13)

And just in case you will allow me one more Bible verse that is known and loved, what better to end with than the benediction of Aaron? "The Lord bless thee and keep thee; the Lord make His face to shine upon thee, and be gracious unto thee; the Lord lift up His countenance upon thee, and give thee peace." (Numbers 6:24-26)

Journey to Jordan and Israel in the of Fall 2012

The Congregational Fellowship Committee is pleased to announce a trip to Jordan and Israel this fall. Our Pastor, Todd Jones, will be leading “this pilgrimage of faith to the Holy Land.” There is an optional eight day extension to Egypt, including a cruise on the Nile River. Emily Eberle will serve as trip host for the entire 18 days of adventure in Jordan, Israel and Egypt.

This exciting trip departs Nashville on October 29, 2012. The Jordan and Israel segment of the trip returns on November 10. For those continuing on to Egypt the return date is November 18.

The cost for the Jordan and Israel portion is \$3,498. The cost for the eight days in Egypt is \$1,398. Prices are based on double occupancy. The cost for both portions of this trip includes airfare from Nashville, first class lodging, breakfast and dinner each day, entry fees to all activities, deluxe motorcoaches, visas, all taxes and gratuities. Local guides will be on the buses in each country.

Beginning in Jordan, we will visit some of the ancient wonders of the world: Jerash, one of the best preserved Roman cities in the world; Mt. Nebo, where Moses viewed the promised land; and Petra, one of the UNESCO World Heritage Sites where The Treasury Building, made famous by the Indiana Jones movie, *The Last Crusade*, will be visited. Crossing into Israel the group will experience the Dead Sea, where there will be time for a quick dip for those who desire.

Israel will offer the places where Jesus lived and taught. The group will visit Jericho, Tiberius, where very close is said to be the traditional site of the baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist. Next, there will be a boat ride on the Sea of Galilee including an on board worship service. The group will travel to Capernaum, the center of Jesus ministry in Galilee and visit the Mount of Beatitudes where Jesus preached to the people. There will be time in Cana, where Jesus performed His first miracle, Nazareth, the boyhood home of Jesus, Bethlehem, where Jesus was born, the Mount of Olives, the Garden of Gethsemane, and the Upper Room, near the traditional site of The Last Supper. A worship service is planned at the Garden Tomb where one may experience the reality of the Resurrection. The Israel portion of this trip concludes with a day at leisure in Jerusalem.

For those continuing on to Egypt, the trip commences with time in Cairo, including a visit to the world famous Cairo Museum and the Pyramids of Giza. The group will fly to Luxor, one of the most interesting cities in the world. There the tour continues with a cruise on the Nile River. The cruise will include visits to the Necropolis of Thebes, Esna, the Temple of Philae, including a felucca ride (small ancient sailing boat), with views of Elephantine Island. The group then flies back to Cairo and has one additional day at leisure before returning to Nashville.

This amazing trip, initially being offered only to First Presbyterian members, is limited to the first 30 people who register. Detailed brochures explaining the registration process are available in the church office. This is truly a once in a lifetime opportunity.

Multi-Media Class Makes Bible Come to Life for Children at FPC

Have you ever walked with King David through the Jerusalem of his day, had King Herod personally show off the temple (the second one) he built there? How about being with the knights as they fought the Crusades, or seen the city in the eyes of a teenaged tourist today? Those in the 3rd grade computer Sunday School class here at FPC have and many, many more things as well!

We have flown through Galilee picking up treasure as we answer questions from our lessons. Traveled with Moses as he led the Israelites from Egypt in the Exodus. Felt the ground shake as Goliath came to face David in battle, and watched as the Princess found Moses floating in a basket in the river.

Each Sunday the children can let their imaginations soar as their Sunday School lesson literally comes alive before them. They have seen the throne of King Nebuchadnezzar as it sat exactly where it did during his reign, and then toured the modern city that has grown around it, watched as Noah gathered the animals for his ark, and seen how we have helped the poor and downtrodden in our own community.

Melding computer technology and multimedia into our faith-based Sunday School lessons has given our children a rich learning experience, stirred their imaginations and helped them along their journey of faith by making these lessons come alive in the classroom. They are both challenged and stimulated by the technology — have you ever tried to help Moses through a maze to find the Promised Land? The audio and video presented in widescreen full-color brilliance and high-fidelity sound can capture their very souls and have them “feel” the lesson. We played a film done by a big band from the 1930s telling the story of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego that had the children literally moving to the beat, and yet at the end of the clip, each and every one of them could tell us the entire story of these wonderful examples of God at work in our lives.



We have shown depictions of what Bethlehem was like at the time of Jesus’ birth, and then taken them to live camera feeds of Bethlehem today celebrating Advent. We have told them about Jerusalem as Jesus entered on Palm Sunday, and then showed them where He prayed in the garden the night before He died and the very hill upon which He was crucified. Sometime this winter, we will be able to carry on a live discussion with 3rd graders in Uganda at the Rev. Ben Tumuheirwe’s orphanage during the Sunday School hour and share some of our lesson with them via webcam and the internet.

The computer lab here in our church has grown into a space that truly lets imaginations come alive, stimulates thought and makes our biblical history become meaningful in ways that story telling alone could never do. Then to see the smiles on the faces of the children as they leave, or have them come back to visit during their high school, college and post-college days to recapture some of that spirit they had in the classroom, shows that they have been touched in a way that will stay with them all of their lives.

We are grateful for the leadership of Burton Dietz, Bill Hathaway, Ellen and Mike Gooden as Third Grade Omega Sunday School leaders in 2011-12.


